## **HOW DO I GET STARTED?**

Rather than getting straight into the tests, it's important to work out what kind of university a student might want (and be suited to). Starting out with 'we want the Ivy League' is unlikely to meet with success, given the significant differences between the Ivy League universities. ## FAQ's

#### DO I NEED THE SAT?

Most US universities accept both the SAT and the ACT (in fact, the ACT tends to suit most UK students better). About 800 US universities including some of the topranked such as NYU, don't require the SAT or ACT

#### WILL I GET INTO A GOOD UNI?

The US has many more students, and many more universities, than the UK does. Though you might have only heard of a small number of US universities, there are huge number of 'good' universities that compare favourably to universities in the UK you may be considering.

#### DO MY EXTRA-CURRICULARS MATTER?

In most cases, when you apply to universities in the USA you don't apply for a subject, and instead are applying for the whole experience of that university. Universities therefore need to know you fit that experience: someone who is a good fit for Columbia may not be a good fit for Brown. Universities will look at what you do beyond your lessons to work out how you might fit their community beyond just academics.
