Stowe Sports Awards 2024

On Friday 17 May, 130 Stoics and Staff came together to celebrate Sport at Stowe.

Our Guest of honour was Graeme White (Bruce 2005) who had an amazing five years at Stowe - debuting for the 1st XI in the Third Form and a permanent fixture thereafter. He was a top all round cricketer scoring two centuries for the 1st XI and taking an incredible 8 five-wicket hauls. He was a fine tactician as well and Captained the 1st XI for two years. During this time, he also represented England from U15 level up to U19 level. He was signed by Northants immediately upon leaving Stowe in 2005 and this was the beginning of an 18-year professional career for Northants and Nottinghamshire, which also included further England representation with the England Lions. In total Graeme took 283 first team wickets and just under 2,000 career runs. Graeme gave an exceptional after dinner speech, reliving some of his memories of his time at Stowe and encouraging the Stoics to make the most of the extraordinary opportunities to play and develop in their Sports at Stowe.

The Dinner culminated in the awarding of sporting colours and then the top prizes to the Player of the Season in each sport by our special guest.

The Stowe Heads of Sports and coaches want to thank all the Stoics for their dedication and commitment in representing their School, we are immensely proud of them all.

Following the speeches, tokens of appreciation in the form of Bruce House cufflinks and ties were presented to the boys. Fifth Former Woody Hamilton Hurst then graciously presented Phil and Joelene Beardon (Matron) with flowers and cards on behalf of the boys.

Interactive (AR) Nature Trail

On Sunday 26 May, we are excited to be launching our interactive Augmented Reality (AR) nature trail. The Ickle Owl AR Trail will be hosted by Stowe National Trust for 16 weeks, running until the end of the Summer holidays. This is a free family friendly activity aimed at children aged 3-10 years (but all ages are very welcome), encouraging them to explore the Stowe grounds and learn more about our native British wildlife. At the start of the trail, visitors will be given a paddle and using the App downloaded on their phones, they will be able to generate an interactive 3D baby owl which they carry around the trail. At different points on the one-hour trail, visitors will interact with five other AR animals.

Storyline

When Ickle, the baby Owl, falls out of the nest and finds herself all alone in the wood. She flaps and flaps her wings, but she isn't quite ready to fly and get back to her nice warm nest. With her mum and dad out hunting for food, she goes in search of help. On the journey Ickle meets other baby animals and learns all about their world, discovering how different their lives are. She learns about what they eat, where they sleep and how they move around. Each animal gives Ickle some of their superpowers to help her find the way home. The baby animals, which will feature as the AR characters include stoat, otter, grass snake, toad and fox.

Pupil-led project

Over the last year, the Stowe Conservation Group has been working with developers to create the AR enhanced App. This has all been funded by pupil-run fundraising events, such as the Junior School Ball and the recent Sixth Form James Bond themed Ball. Our pupils have created the storyline, devised the character's appearance and traits from scratch, designed the trail route and are currently supporting the online and print marketing and promotion of the trail through filming a promotional video, engaging local social media influencers and advertising the opportunity to local primary schools.

Mental Health Awareness Week

Mental Health Awareness Week's focus for 2024 was on movement. Three talks were arranged to discuss the relationship between movement and mental health.

On Monday 13 May we kicked off the Week with a talk from Jonathan Bentley (Chief Marketing Officer) from GOVOX; the wellbeing platform used by Stowe to check in on the Stoics every half term, and Victoria Monk, who is a passionate advocate for raising girls' participation in sport and who recently rowed across the Atlantic as part of a four person all female crew. The talk was a mix on informative insight into the biochemistry around why exercise is so good for your mental health and also the awe-inspiring story of Victoria's row across the Atlantic. Her average sleep length of two hours a day for 39 days was the standout insight along with the utter grit and resilience showed by Victoria and her crew to navigate some of the worst storms in the race's history.

We welcomed Kearnan Myall on Tuesday 14 May. A professional rugby player for 17 years, playing at Leeds Tykes, Sale Sharks and London Wasps and who was capped six times by England Saxons and earned a Senior England call up.

Kearnan's talk was deeply personal and moving as he detailed his own battles with mental health and how he overcame them. Offering insightful and tangible advice to the Stoics on how to look after their own mental health. It was a real privilege to welcome Kearnan to Stowe and for him to take time out of his busy schedule being the Performance Director for all GB snow sports.

The week ended with a talk from Brian Maloney who is a Ballet Rehabilitation Specialist and Class Teacher of The Royal Ballet. After training at the Kirov Academy of Ballet he later joined The Royal Ballet in 2000 - a dream and ultimate goal he aspired to. In his 13-year dance career as a soloist at The Royal Ballet, Brian performed in many of the classic and modern ballets.

We heard about the beginnings and the journey of discipline, the bullying, the issues around body image, through to a Swan Lake performance where he thought he may not be able to dance again. It was the support from friends and family, the routine and structure of the training and the dream that kept him going - coming back to the barre, back to basics everyday was like an old familiar friend, it was a reset button and still is. Today. as well as been a class teacher, Brian currently manages the ballet specific rehabilitation pathways for dancers of the Royal Ballet, a career that came about after the recovery work with coaches following his own injury. At the end of the talk Brian taught some basic ballet movements which every dancer has to learn, and does every day as part of their warm up - at whatever level they are performing at.



Exploring the Future of Work and Universal Basic Income

On Tuesday 7 May, a select group of Lower Sixth pupils gathered in the Music Library in the Chung Music School, for a discussion led by Dr Kirk Surgener, a prominent philosopher from the University of Warwick's esteemed Philosophy, Politics and Economics (PPE) programme. The intimate gathering included ten enthusiastic Stoics and a special guest, Henry, from the Royal Latin School.



Dr Surgener, renowned for his expertise in ancient philosophy, feminist philosophy and moral philosophy, delved into the pressing issue of automation and its impact on future employment. His talk centred around the potential threat of mass unemployment due to increasing automation and examined universal basic income (UBI) as a potential policy solution.

In his talk, Dr Surgener highlighted how advances in technology have increased the risk of job automation, posing significant challenges for future employment. He referenced a study by Osborne and Frey, which estimated that 47% of US jobs could be at risk of automation in the next 20 years. With this context, he presented UBI as a bold proposal to address the potential problem. The discussion explored UBI's potential benefits, including its ability to provide financial security, stimulate spending and address feminist concerns. Dr Surgener also examined the interdisciplinary approach of the PPE programme, illustrating how combining philosophy, politics and economics offers unique insights into complex social phenomena.

During the session, Dr Surgener outlined the structure of Warwick's PPE programme, highlighting its flexibility and the diverse career paths of its graduates. The talk also offered valuable insights into what Warwick looks for in strong candidates, emphasising the importance of academic potential and a demonstrated interest in at least two of the three disciplines. Pupils then asked lots of questions about how to differentiate their applications to world-class universities like Warwick, which is ranked No.1 for Economics.

The pupils' active participation throughout the talk was a testament to the intellectually stimulating nature of the discussion. Dr Surgener's talk explored the value of interdisciplinary education in addressing pressing

social issues. It provided pupils with unique insights into the future of work and the potential of universal basic income as a solution to the challenges posed by automation. The event concluded with a lively Q&A session, where pupils had the opportunity to ask questions and further explore the topics discussed. Click **here** to watch the talk.

Working with Primary Schools



STOWE HOUSE PRESERVATION TRUST

Stowe's Menagerie ceiling restoration



For those of you that didn't know, Stowe has a menagerie on site, and I'm not just talking about the pupils at dinner time! The School Shop is housed in the 1781 menagerie, originally built for Lady Buckingham to escape from the busy Main Mansion during the Georgian entertaining season. Although the definition of a menagerie is a collection of captured animals in one place, there is little evidence it ever held such and was more likely an aviary. By the 1820s, it had been turned into The Museum, holding one of the best collections of British geological specimens in the county, along with plenty of stuffed animals. The fame of the collection spread when Lady Buckingham's son, the 1st Duke of Buckingham and Chandos, bought a near complete plesiosaurus from fossil collector Mary Anning, apparently very cheaply. The Museum was visited by Oueen Victoria and Prince Albert during their short visit in January 1845. During the infamous Stowe sale of 1848, most of this mineral collection was sold to Professor James Tennant of King's College London (later sold to the founding Western Australia Museum), and the plesiosaurus was sold to the British Museum for eight pounds and eight shillings.

The building has housed the School Shop since the 1990s, and over the years there have been several different schemes to appropriate it to another use, but a shop it remains. It is the only historic building on site that remains in the hands of Stowe School (and all the maintenance costs that go with it!).

But, following the restoration of the building's roof and glass dome last year, it is the painted ceiling of the central dome that is the focus of this piece - funds having been donated by Rodney (Walpole 48) and Beryl Tattershall-Wright to conserve it. The painting is attributed to Vincenzo Valdrè, who also

executed the State Music Room and probably the State Drawing (Temple) Room ceiling. The ceiling depicts statues of seated women amongst an ivy-clad trellis with various birds and vases. During the work, the conservators, Cliveden Conservation, discovered perhaps three additional schemes added to the original over the years. This resulted in the trellis being widened, leaves and flower garlands added, and the female faces 'refined'. Once on the scaffolding, it was clear that the garlands of flowers had been added later, perhaps by 40 years, the style of which was rather basic upon further inspection. On the ledge below the ceiling, the conservators found a signature, Joshua Phillips,

and suggested that the paintbrush cleaning marks nearby could indicate that he might have been the originator of the garland (and different from the Joshua Harris signature found on the State Dining Room ledge). The level of conservation meant that later leaf and trellis additions (possibly by the School in the 1950s) were taken off to give it a lighter appearance. However, the original colours were not added back in, as we could not be sure of the depth of the colour. The result is a brighter, lighter painting that deserves the central position in the building, lit beautifully by the oculus above. Please do take the time to look up the next time you are in the School Shop.
