#### **04** DEVELOP SOME GOOD HABITS

Eat the right things; get eight hours sleep; physical activity keeps the brain healthy, reduces stress, improves memory, resilience, social connectedness, creativity and productivity. The World Health Organisation recommends one hour of exercise each day for pupils at secondary school.



Successful people realise that mistakes take them one step closer to success. They don't fear failure and see it as deferred success. Own your mistakes and use them to accelerate the learning experience. Success or failure is too binary. You don't need to excel at something for it to be worthwhile: we all start somewhere - writing bad poetry, playing the violin tunelessly, missing most of the shots you take at goal. This is not a zerosum goal as there is always someone smarter, richer, faster, and more competent than you. If you don't succeed, try again, and fail better. When you say that you can't do something, add the three-letter word, yet.

#### 02 SUCCESSFUL PEOPLE DON'T PROCRASTINATE

They find the time to get things done. There is seldom a perfect time to do something, but procrastination is the thief of time as you put off until tomorrow what should have been done yesterday.



They will introduce you to the best that has been known, said, and thought throughout the ages. They provide entertainment, allow you to defy the bounds of your own mortality, expand your knowledge, and help you to think differently.

## **18** SPEND TIME WITH INSPIRING PEOPLE

Successful people spend time with people who are motivated and positive, limiting their exposure to people who are negative, cynical, and toxic. Surround yourself with enthusiastic friends: you will find that their positivity and energy will rub off onto you. Friendships at school can often last a lifetime, giving support and help when we need it most. Strong social relationships are linked to higher levels of self-esteem and even give a boost to your immune system.

#### 03 ON THE SUBJECT OF TIME, BE ON TIME

There really is no excuse for being late. You are telling another person that you consider your time to be more precious than theirs. Develop good routines such as sorting out your files and bags before you go to bed. Stay off social media except for designated times as a reward for accomplishing other tasks. Remember that no one knew that they had to have Tik Tok, WhatsApp or social media until Apple invented the smart phone.

### **O6** PRACTICE MINDFULNESS **AND MEDITATION**

We spend too much time worrying about things that will never happen, catastrophising about things that we cannot control... it's important to put things in perspective and decompress.

### 09 MUSIC, ART AND DRAMA

The Arts offer opportunities to make meaningful connections and develop empathy and understanding for others. Collaborating with other Stoics to reflect different cultures, values and societies improves tolerance and understanding as well as bringing mental and physical health benefits.

Life is inordinately precious, finite and beautiful. Revel in the sheer good fortune of being here. Their hard work has ensured that the space is not only functional but also safe and welcoming for all who use it.

As we settle into this extraordinary new chapter, the Howden Centre promises to become a cornerstone of our School's Design, Technology and Engineering journey. It is a space where innovation meets tradition, and where the Stoics of today can shape the ideas of tomorrow.

# Year Group Leaders

This initiative endeavours to foster collaboration, accountability and mentorship while upholding our Stowe Change Maker philosophy.

#### What is a Year Group Leader?

The Year Group Leader role is designed for pupils to actively support their peers, Staff, and the wider School community. As a Year Group Leader, pupils act as a vital link between their Year Group and the Leadership Team, providing guidance, support and direction. They collaborate closely with Rhea Stafford-Smith (Head of Lower School), as well as Houseparents and House Prefects.

This unique position emphasises holistic development, with Year Group Leaders fostering a nurturing and inclusive environment that supports academic, social and personal growth.

#### **Key Responsibilities**

- **Guidance and Mentorship:** Act as a point of contact and support for peers, providing guidance on School life, academics, and personal challenges.
- **Collaboration:** Work alongside Staff, Prefects, and House teams to ensure seamless communication and coordination within the Year Group.
- Leadership: Embody Stowe's values and lead by example, inspiring peers to uphold the School's standards and ethos.
- Community Building: Assist in creating a positive and inclusive environment, promoting teamwork and respect among pupils.

#### **The Selection Process**

Year Group Leaders are chosen through an application and interview process. Candidates must demonstrate excellence across several key areas:

- **1. Exemplary Record:** A strong history of positive behaviour and contribution.
- Commitment to the Change Maker Philosophy: An understanding of and dedication to Stowe's vision of inspiring change and making a difference.
- Alignment with Stowe's Values: An appreciation for the School's core values and a commitment to upholding them.
- **4.** Leadership Attributes: Passion, energy, optimism, and the ability to take initiative and drive positive change.
- **5. Team Collaboration:** Strong interpersonal skills and the ability to foster collaborative relationships with Staff and peers.
- Relationship Building: The capacity to develop and maintain meaningful connections within the School community.
- Strength of Character: The moral courage to stand up for what is right and to serve as a role model for others.

#### Why Year Group Leaders Matter

The introduction of Year Group Leaders allows pupils to develop leadership skills at an earlier stage, with the guidance and mentorship of Senior Prefects and Staff. This role encourages pupils to step into positions of responsibility, empowering them to make meaningful contributions to the School community while preparing them for future challenges.



# DRAMA

## **LAMDA Exam Results**

London Academy of Music and Dramatic Art (LAMDA) pupils at Stowe were richly rewarded for their hard work in November, when they received excellent results for their exams.

Each pupil was required to perform either two or three monologues or duologues for our visiting LAMDA examiner, across differing styles of theatre, with their performances were graded out of a maximum of 100 marks.

Edward Mercer (Upper Sixth, Grafton) achieved a very high Distinction for his Grade 8 Acting exam with a mark of 96, while James Barnett (Fifth Form, Winton) achieved a high Distinction for Grade 7, with a mark of 92. Upper Sixth performers Daria Kulbayeva (West) and Isabelle Hunponu-Wusu (Stanhope) also achieved a Distinction for Grade 8 in their duologue exam with marks of 86 and 87 respectively.

Fifth Former Tia Sualp (Lyttelton) received an excellent Distinction for her solo Grade 6 exam, with a mark of 93, while duologue performers Camilla Allan (Fourth Form, Stanhope) and Clemmy King (Fourth Form, Queen's) received high merits for their Grade 6, with marks of 77 and 78. Harrison Teodorani-Fabbri (Fifth Form, Temple) achieved a Distinction for his Grade 5 solo exam and Victoria Lee (Fifth Form, Cheshire) who took a Grade 5 solo Musical Theatre exam and received a Distinction with a mark of 89.

They all deserve much applause, as results like these require a huge amount of preparation. The Stoics worked hard at linelearning, character development and studying the theatrical eras from which the pieces were taken. Well done to all!

It was incredible to watch the pupils' skills improve at such a rapid pace - and their driving abilities were unrecognisable in just 30 minutes. One of the highlights for many Stoics was driving down a straight stretch at 60 mph, trusting their instructor's guidance on braking as they approached a car ahead. The rush of excitement as they got closer to the car was matched only by the thrill of knowing they were in control. It was a moment of true empowerment and excitement, not going to be forgotten for a long time.

## Fern Parker in the Montane Spine Race

At 8am on the morning of Saturday 11 January, Fern Parker (Cheshire Matron) started the Montane Winter Challenger South race. Billed as one of Britain's most brutal endurance races, the Challenger South (part of the Montane Spine Race series) is a non-stop, 108 mile race along the Pennine Way.

Beginning from Edale in Derbyshire, runners have a time limit of 60 hours to get to the finish at Hawes, taking in the Kinder Plateau, numerous National Parks, Malham Cove and Pen-y-ghent. A daunting route at the best of times, however even more so, given the extreme temperatures and wintry conditions that Fern faced! At midday on Sunday, Fern was over halfway and approaching Skipton - with Pen-y-ghent and the Yorkshire moors still ahead of her. Fern finally crossed the finish line at 11.17am on Monday 13 January, completing the 108 Miles in 51.17 hours.

161 competitors started out, with only 71 crossing the finish line. Fern was the 9th female to finish and a very impressive 40th overall.

This is by no means Fern's first endurance race. Last year, amongst other 100 mile events, she completed the Challenger North event – the next 160 miles of the route to the Scottish border; which she finished as the second fastest female competitor! In 2026 Fern hopes to link the two sections together and complete the full Spine Race of 268 miles, which is considered the most brutal endurance event in the UK.

## World First Record-Breaking Pacific Ocean Rowing Expedition

Lottie Hopkinson-Woolley (Stanhope 18) is setting out with her two crewmates, Miriam Payne and Jess Rowe, to become the first team to row the entire Pacific Ocean, 8,000 miles, non-stop and unsupported. Facing 30ft+ waves, severe sleep deprivation, encounters with



marine wildlife, and much more, they are gearing up for a true test of endurance and resilience.

But beyond the physical challenge, the team is committed to pushing their own boundaries and making children around the world realise that they are capable of more than they think. This journey is about proving that anything is possible if you put your mind to something.

Departing in April 2025 from Peru, South America, the crew will row continuously west for 8,000 miles until they reach the shores of Australia, finishing their journey in Sydney Harbour. The expedition is expected to take 150+ days without a support boat or any stops along the way, making them completely self-sufficient throughout the challenge.

The team is still actively seeking corporate sponsors and crowdfunding support for this incredible journey. Their 9.2m ocean rowing boat Velocity is on her way to Peru, along with all the equipment and food they'll need to survive and thrive on the open sea. There is still time to sponsor the boat and have your logo put on her please get in touch! Velocity is currently a blank canvas, with sponsor logos set to be added when the team arrives in Peru at the beginning of March.

It has been inspiring to see the incredible support the team has already received from Old Stoics. Their shipping costs have been generously covered by the OEC Group, thanks to Anthony Fullbrook (Walpole 88). The team is benefiting greatly from the invaluable guidance of Jonathan Sucksmith (Walpole 92), who is their operations guru and liaison in Peru.

## Arvind Ethan David Inspires Lower Sixth Stoics

On Monday 9 December, Film Producer Arvind Ethan David (Chatham 93) brought his wit, wisdom and creative insight to the Lower Sixth in the Ugland Auditorium. Despite a transatlantic journey from LA and navigating the quintessentially British train delays, Arvind arrived punctually, following an energetic introduction from Mr Elwell.

In his engaging talk, Arvind explored the unlikely but fascinating parallels between two literary giants, PG Wodehouse and Raymond Chandler, both alumni of Dulwich College. He shared how their shared classical education under renowned teachers shaped their masterful command of language, from Chandler's evocative noir prose to Wodehouse's sparkling comedies of manners.

Arvind recounted how his own career, zigzagging across books, theatre, TV and film, often brought him into collaboration with greats such as Douglas Adams and David Baddiel. Yet, he noted with humour and humility, his current projects - adapting Wodehouse and Chandler pose a unique challenge; crafting dialogue that can stand alongside their iconic lines.

Through anecdotes and analysis, he highlighted the deep commonalities in Wodehouse and Chandler's styles: their shared love for musicality in language, heroic metaphors and unexpected similes. Arvind's vivid descriptions brought their brilliance to life, weaving a narrative that celebrated their creativity, the formative power of education, and the enduring importance of teachers. Closing with a Q&A, Arvind invited the Stoics to reflect on their own inspirations and the value of mentorship in creative and academic pursuits. His parting message was a simple yet profound reminder, "greatness often begins

in the classroom, where teachers and peers plant the seeds of future success".

On Wednesday 8 January parents of Fifth Formers interested in American universities were invited to attend an online coffee morning to find out more about the application process and university landscape.

Rebecca Pretorious, from Crimson Education, introduced all the aspects of this multi-facetted application process including the benefits of the US university style education and the importance of starting the application process early. The US application has many parts including SATs, multiple essays, transcript and reports, teacher and counsellor recommendation, activities list and, depending on where you apply, the Com App.

However, despite all stages in the process, in the USA it often comes down to 'Best Fit' - is the applicant best suited to the university academically and personally? The US has different types of institutions including the Ivy League Schools, public and private colleges, as well as Liberal Arts Colleges and specialist universities. All of these have specific characteristics and differences. It is therefore important to start the research process into the different types of colleges and universities early to ensure the Best Fit and a successful application.

Universities are looking for the complete package - a student who is intellectually curious, impact focused, committed, an initiative taker, and someone who cares about their community and others. Therefore, not only academic grades and achievements are of importance but also extracurricular activities like volunteering, the arts, sport and academic competitions are very beneficial.

## Adding to the Stowe Collection

Having finally achieved the change of wording we needed for Stowe House Preservation Trust to start working towards Museum Accreditation at the end of last year, we started the new year with the purchase of a Temple-Grenville cup and saucer, to match two items from the same tea set that we already have.

Exactly four years ago, the Hall Bequest Trust purchased two items from America which had the Stowe family crest on them. The milk jug and sugar bowl were part of tea set decorated with laurel and berries - which at Christmas time, seemed most apt! They were made by the Worcester Porcelain Factory around 1810, and bear the coronet and martlet of Earl Temple (along with the family motto, 'Templa Quam Dilecta'). This could imply that it was commissioned by the son of Stowe's owner at that time, the Marquess of Buckingham, who was Earl Temple, or the Marquess commissioned the set himself with an earlier family design.

A few weeks ago, we were offered a cup and saucer from the same set by a local dealer, who had purchased it from a dealer in Australia five years ago - demonstrating how far and wide the family's possessions spread.

The tea set is not mentioned specifically in the 1848 or 1922 sales catalogues which could indicate either that it was not deemed important enough to put in as a separate item, or it was not put up for sale and was passed down through the family after the sales. I suspect we will never know.

The cup and saucer join the other pieces of Stowe ceramics currently on display in the SHPT Museum, while we continue to undertake a little more research through the Museum of Royal Worcester.

## Sleeping Bag Donations to Sheltersuit

During the Michaelmas Term Stowe Ubuntu Society and CCF joined forces and decided to work on the Human Rights Article 25 sub-article 1, which states;

'Everyone has the right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of himself and of his family, including food, clothing, housing and medical care and necessary social services, and the right to security in the event of unemployment, sickness, disability, widowhood, old age or other lack of livelihood in circumstances beyond his control.'

As a group, we decided to focus on our universal right to a standard of living adequate for the health and well-being of oneself and their family, specifically the right to adequate clothing. After a discussion with Major Arnold, we discovered that CCF had many unused sleeping bags and fleeces, taking up valuable space in store cupboards. We took a group of our Ubuntu Society Members to the CCF stores in Plug Street on a cold, snowy day before the Christmas break. The weather didn't impact on our spirits and we all had fun and enjoyed the task at hand. Using our Change Maker teamwork and initiative we transported the sleeping bags from stores to Miss Barbeli's classroom and organised the fleeces into bags according to size.

After some research we found ShelterSuit, an active charity in the United Kingdom, Europe, America and South Africa, which up-cycles sleeping bags and waterproof materials to create the 'ShelterSuit' and the 'ShelterBag'. The charity employs people with a distance between themselves and the labour market, helping people who might not have a chance at being employed and earning money. The ShelterSuit is a full body waterproof device used to protect homeless people from the weather. The ShelterBag is a portable and lightweight sleeping bag that can be rolled up and carried, making it easy to transport. It has a built-in mattress and is waterproof, providing comfort to those sleeping rough. We contacted the team at ShelterSuit and they came and collected the sleeping bags, telling us that every sleeping bag we have donated could be saving a life this Winter.

During the Lent Term we are looking to donate the CCF fleeces to 'Collection4Clothes', a charity based in Milton Keynes that sorts and donates clothes and sends them to people in need all over the world. We are working towards setting up a clothes drive after the January Exeat, where we are hoping for Stoics to donate warm Winter clothes, in good condition.

Stowe Ubuntu Society is grateful for Major Arnold's support and kind gesture on behalf of Stowe CCF, to donate sleeping bags and fleeces to people who need them most.
