On Sunday 10 and Monday 11 November, the School, led by the Combined Cadet Force in this, its Centenary year, reflected on the sacrifices of Stoics past and present throughout a series of poignant events. The weekend was a tapestry of moving tributes, culminating in a profound sense of gratitude and remembrance.

The weekend commenced with the CCF contingent, resplendent in their uniforms, leading a parade on Chapel Forecourt. Major General (Retd) Rob Thomson was impressed with all the polished boots and smart looking Cadets as he inspected the ranks prior to proceeding into the Chapel for the heart of the Remembrance weekend.

During the Service of Remembrance, the memorial board honouring Old Stoics who gave their lives in service to their country since the end of World War II was rededicated. The reading of the special Roll of Honour, including the names of seven Old Stoics who fell in conflicts other than WWII, resonated deeply. This year, we especially remembered Flying Officer Nigel Davison and Captain John Pooley, whose names were added to the memorial. We were deeply honoured to be joined by their families for this moving occasion.

As is customary, wreaths were laid by the Head, a representative from the Chair of Governors, the Chair of the Old Stoic Society, a representative from the Support Staff, the Head Boy and Head Girl,

and the Head Cadet, each accompanied by CCF escorts. It was a powerful symbol of our collective remembrance.

It was a weekend filled with both sorrow and gratitude, reminding us of the importance of honouring their memory and upholding the values they fought to protect.

Courage, Conviction and Compassion

It was a great honour to welcome Major General (Retd) Rob Thomson to Stowe to preach at our Service of Remembrance.

The General was accompanied by his wife and three of his five children, and in the interview during the service recounted his journey to faith as a teenager. When asked about the impact of his Christian faith on his leadership over 34 years, Major General Thomson spoke of the harmony between the servant leadership of Jesus and the motto of Sandhurst Military Academy, 'Serve to Lead'.

In his excellent sermon, Major General Thomson spoke of the importance of conviction, courage and compassion in every walk of life. He described three soldiers with whom he had served and how they each epitomised these characteristics in extraordinarily difficult circumstances in Afghanistan. His unique perspective of these men and women, some not much older than our Upper Sixth, provided a poignant example of sacrifice for others.

The General then spoke of how each of these examples point us to the even greater example of Jesus Christ, whose courage, conviction and compassion is seen most clearly in his sacrifice of himself for humanity.

We are grateful to Major General Thomson for coming to Stowe and for his honesty in sharing this powerful message with us.

Against the stunning backdrop of the Grecian Valley, the Stowe School community gathered to honour those who have lost their lives in conflicts. Central to the ceremony were 1,457 silhouettes of the 'For your Tomorrow' installation representing World War II service personnel who perished during the D-Day landings on 6 June 1944.

The service offered pupils, Staff, National Trust employees and the public the opportunity to come together in reflection and remembrance. Set in Stowe's serene landscaped gardens, the event was a poignant reminder of the sacrifices made by so many, including those with personal connections to the Stowe community.

Participants assembled in their designated positions, standing solemnly beside the silhouettes of the fallen. Tutors joined their tutees, and Houses stood in unison, emphasising the collective spirit of the day.

The ceremony commenced with 'The Exhortation', delivered by Tanya Brittain, National Trust General Manager, followed by a hauntingly beautiful rendition of 'The Last Post' by Isabel Cox (Upper Sixth, Cheshire). At precisely 11:00, the community observed a two-minute silence, echoing the national tradition observed since 1919 to mark the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month.

The silence was broken by the clear, resonant notes of 'The Reveille', again performed by Isabel Cox, before Darcey Moran (Upper Sixth, West) recited the 'Kohima Epitaph':

"When you go home, tell them of us and say, For your tomorrow, we gave our today."

The service concluded with a prayer led by the Reverend James Righetti, whose words encapsulated the solemnity and significance of the occasion.













Reflections and Gratitude

Senior Deputy Head Liam Copley commended the impeccable behaviour and respect shown by the pupils throughout the service. "It was a truly moving experience, witnessing the unity and reverence displayed in such a sublime setting made me immensely proud. Members of the public approached me afterward to commend the School's conduct, which is the highest compliment we could receive."

This year's Armistice Service served as a powerful reflection of Stowe's values - respect, remembrance, and unity - reinforcing the importance of honouring those who made the ultimate sacrifice.



Learning Differently at Bruern Abbey

Neurodiversity is the recognition that neurological differences, such as Autism, Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD), Dyslexia, and other cognitive variations, are part of human diversity rather than disorders to be cured. Embracing neurodiversity promotes inclusion and understanding, emphasising that people with these differences may have unique strengths and perspectives.

At Bruern Abbey, an inclusive prep school, children with diverse neurodivergent profiles are welcomed and supported through tailored approaches. The school provides smaller class sizes, allows the use of laptops and offers extra support to meet pupils' needs. With many facing challenges in English and maths, Bruern Abbey doubles the amount of instruction in these areas compared to typical prep schools. As volunteers, Stoics help in these classes as well as in history, science and creative subjects. At the end of each day, we also read with the Year 6 class, providing focused, one-to-one support.

Set in the Oxfordshire countryside, Bruern Abbey offers its pupils ample outdoor space and a calm, supportive atmosphere. On our first visit, we noticed the expansive, park-like playground with climbing and swinging facilities that encourage physical activity and play. This supportive setting allows us to connect with pupils at their own pace, offering encouragement and the extra help they need in order to thrive.

London Galleries

On Wednesday 2 October, the Upper Sixth Art Historians embarked on a trip to London for some insightful gallery visits exploring our new topics of 'Identities and Modernism'.

Upon our arrival we promptly headed to The Courtauld Gallery to see the 'Monet and London' exhibition. This featured several of Claude Monet's impressionist paintings of England's Capital City. Depicting sites such as Charing Cross Bridge, The Houses of Parliament and Waterloo Bridge from a view over the River Thames, these eyecatching works were full of radiant colour and yet masked in a mysterious light, reminiscent of the smog seen in mid 19th Century London. This was a once in a lifetime opportunity to see so many works from this series exhibited together.

After this we explored the permanent collection which comprises a range of impressionist and post-impressionist paintings. We compared the styles, techniques, aims and innovations of artists including Edouard Manet, Paul Cezanne, Edgar Degas and Vincent Van Gogh, and considered their role in the creation of modern art. The 'Self-Portrait with Bandaged Ear' by Van Gogh is one of our selected case studies for this term, and it was extremely beneficial for the group to view this work up close and examine the thoughtful use of colour and the expressive brushwork.

After a quick lunch break in London's historic Borough Market, we headed off to our next gallery.

The Tate Modern's exhibition on 'Expressionists Kandinsky, Munter and the Blue Rider' gave us another angle from which to study the early 20th Century. This was an exhibition on the 'The Blue Rider' artistic group who in their own words created 'a union of various countries - to preserve one purpose' - to transform modern art. We learned that these pioneering artists intended their art to express emotion rather than their subject's physical reality. Viewing this exhibition showed us the boundaries these artists broke, looking at and focusing on abstraction rather than realism. A prominent example of this abstraction is in Wassily Kandinsky's 'Cossacks' (1910-11). It also helped to shed a light on the contribution of female artists to the movement, such as Gabriele Munter whose works were both arresting and eery.

Early in the morning of Thursday 17 October, seven intrepid RAF Cadets (Sgt Lani Shah (Lower Sixth, Cheshire), Sgt James Delap (Lower Sixth, Temple), Sgt Luke Letchford (Lower Sixth, Temple), L Cpl Rufus Shillington (Lower Sixth, Temple), Cadet Rosie Allchurch (Lower Sixth, Lyttelton), Cadet Tobi Jimoh (Lower Sixth, Chandos) and Cadet Sam Zhang (Upper Sixth, Walpole) left Stowe for RAF Benson, for an Air Experience Flight (AEF) with the RAF.

Upon arrival, they were briefed on emergency drills and kitted out with parachutes and helmets. Each Cadet then took to glorious clear skies in a Grob Tutor T1, which is an all-composite aerobatic sport plane used by the RAF, the Fleet Air Arm and the Army Air Core for flying training. Having experienced some basic manoeuvres, the pilot then treated them to loops and stunts. As an unexpected bonus, the Cadets were then able to speak to an air ambulance crew and look around their helicopter. The Stowe 2024 Big Issue Conference: Age UK

Every year, Stoics take part in the Big Issue Conference, which sees the School partner with a charity group to look at a local, national or international social issue and then come up with a meaningful, specific and practical response.

This year Stowe partnered with Age UK, the leading charity in the UK for older people. The entire School gathered in the Chapel on Saturday 19 October to listen to two representatives, from Age UK Buckinghamshire, explain the aims of the charity and the issues facing the growing older population, such as loneliness, the cost of living and ageism.

The presentation was well-pitched and interactive, detailing important statistics, with several questions directed to the audience. Work carried out by Age UK Buckinghamshire and their 240 volunteers, aids 6000 local older people in the county every year, and the need to support older people is growing. Several videos were played, which gave us insight into the lives of the elderly and how the charity assists both individuals and the wider community.

Following the presentation we broke out into 75 different groups, of around 10 to 12 pupils, each led by a Sixth Former and assisted by a member of Staff. The groups were to identify one of the key issues raised by the charity (health and wellbeing, loneliness and isolation, digital exclusion, making ends meet, and stigma and stereotypes) and then to collaborate and design an activity which could be chosen by a Fourth Form Tutor Group to use for their volunteering Change Maker Day on Friday 27 February 2025.

The sessions were split in two, one before break for planning and research, and the second to think more practically and logistically, to come

up with a genuine activity that could make a real difference and provide an enjoyable day for the elderly. In the second session, groups created PowerPoint presentations to summarise their ideas, using a prompt sheet of questions to help focus on the details.

There were some excellent ideas, such as running an inter-care home singing competition, hosting a day of activities and technology help workshops at Stowe, or organising a mobility scooter derby to raise money and awareness for Age UK. The winning groups will be given prizes, and all the ideas generated will also be available for the Fourth Form Tutor Groups to select for their day in February.

We would like to thank the representatives from Age UK Buckinghamshire, as well as the entire Stowe team, who helped to make this such an enjoyable and informative day for all.

BIG BOAT SAILING TRIP

This trip is open to any pupil, regardless of previous sailing experience - we are simply looking for pupils who are up for a challenge and want to be fully involved in sailing a boat throughout the trip.

Over the five days, the crew will be able to work towards achieving their Royal Yachting Association (RYA) Competent Crew Certificate. A strong performance on this trip also opens the opportunity to sail in the tall ships race with the sailing charity hosting us for this trip.

Maths Challenge Competitions

At Stowe our top mathematicians have the opportunity to participate in the UKMT Maths Challenge competitions which run nationally each academic year. We have an increasing number of participants and we would like to celebrate the achievements of our pupils.

On Wednesday 25 September, five of our Lower Sixth Further Mathematicians completed The Mathematical Olympiad for Girls. This national competition is aimed at girls and young women across the UK and consists of five challenging problems. Over 750 schools across the country took part this year, with the aim to encourage more young people to engage with interesting mathematics.

Elizabeth Cheng (West), Katherine Liu (Queen's), Kelly Hu (West), Arabella Fraser (Queen's), and Gaia Mesonero-Perez (Lyttelton) took part, submitting written solutions that were sent away to be marked by UKMT mathematicians. During Half Term the results were announced, and I am pleased to share that Elizabeth, Arabella and Gaia were awarded Certificates of Merit for their solutions, while Kelly put in a fantastic performance to score 80%, earning her a Certificate of Distinction.

Well done to all the girls for taking part!

On Friday 1 October, 97 Stoics sat the Senior Maths Challenge paper. This national annual competition is aimed at pupils in both the Lower and Upper Sixth, however we also had some Lower School mathematicians entering too. This was a record number of participants for Stowe and it was brilliant to see so many pupils showcasing their analytical thinking skills to solve some tricky non-calculator problems. The Stoics who participated went on to achieve 35 Bronze awards and 17 Silver awards. Nine Stoics achieved Gold awards and have qualified for further competitions.

Congratulations to Ari Lewis (Lower Sixth, Walpole), James Zheng (Upper Sixth, Chandos) and Ethel Zhu (Upper Sixth, West) on their Gold awards.

Special mentions go to: Niamh Byrne (Fifth Form, Cheshire) who achieved a Gold award 'Best in Fifth Form', Jason Lu (Lower Sixth, Walpole) whose Gold award placed him as 'Best in Lower Sixth', and Upper Sixth pupils Calon Heaven (Grenville), Gilbert Xu (Chandos) and Ryan Zheng (Grenville) for the achievement of receiving Gold awards two years in a row.

Finally, Sam Zhang (Upper Sixth, Walpole) achieved the coveted title of 'Best in School'. This means Sam has qualified for the 'British Mathematical Olympiad Round 1', which is an extremely prestigious competition.

The competition took place on Wednesday 20 November, so at the time of writing we await news of how he got on. Well done Sam!






US Politics Talk

LSAS Visit the 'Fragile Beauty' Exhibition at the V&A



Each year the Parents' Gap Scholarships offer Gap Year Awards to Sixth Formers of between £1,000-£2,000, depending on the nature of the voluntary work to be undertaken. The allocation of these awards is competitive, and applicants are given after a searching interview. Applications are usually due shortly after the Christmas break, with interviews taking place in early February. Advice and help is offered with preparation for the applications over the course of the Michaelmas Term.

Thanks to the Parent's Gap Year Award, after my A Levels, I had the opportunity to visit Nepal and Cambodia, where I volunteered teaching and caring for children. I worked with Projects Abroad, who helped with the planning and organisation. They provided language resources, tips for adjusting to the local culture and contact details for fellow volunteers, making the volunteer experience a smooth one.

Nepal

Landing in Kathmandu on November 1, 2023, was overwhelming despite all my preparations. After meeting my Projects Abroad driver, I was taken to a hotel in central Kathmandu. The next day, I was introduced to the Nepal program leader, who gave me a quick tour of the city before driving me to my accommodation. I stayed with Camille, Yadev, their daughter, and their two dogs. I also met my fellow volunteers, with whom I walked to Sunrise English Boarding School each day, to teach English and Nepali to children aged 3-7. During my stay, I got to experience the vibrant celebrations of Tihar, dress in a saree and participate in dances with my students.

We also visited temples and took a bumpy bus ride to Pokhara, where we kayaked, hiked and enjoyed sunsets together. My favourite moments were watching the sun set over the Himalayas with my new friends. When it was time to leave, I said heartfelt goodbyes to the people I'd grown close to and prepared for the next adventure in Cambodia.

Cambodia

My arrival in Cambodia was less stressful than Nepal, and I quickly adjusted to life in Phnom Penh. I stayed in a flat with other volunteers and took Khmer lessons to help with communication. Each day, I was driven in a tuktuk, took a ferry to Silk Island and then biked to my preschool. Unlike in Nepal, most teachers and children spoke little to no English, so my language skills were essential. I worked mostly with a quiet boy named Elle, helping him build social skills and confidence.

Weekends were spent exploring the city, trying street food, and visiting temples. The most rewarding part of my time in Cambodia was watching Elle grow in confidence and improve his language skills. After a month, I said goodbye to my new friends and continued exploring Cambodia on my own.

Reflection

Volunteering before traveling solo made me feel more comfortable in new places, boosting my confidence. I learned not to stress about small things, whether exams or daily challenges. It was liberating to let go of insecurities, and I realized that treating everyone with kindness often leads to meaningful connections. Traveling also taught me to budget wisely, be patient and appreciate the small moments in life. I returned home more confident, grateful and eager to meet new people.

I highly recommend volunteering abroad to anyone seeking new experiences. It's a life-changing opportunity that brings lasting friendships and invaluable memories.

Safeguarding at Stowe CHATBOTS



If you have never heard of this platform, it is essentially a chatbot service where users (13+) can create and/or chat with existing characters where the chatbot will give human-like responses.

Children from Year 3 upwards have been using and conversing with chatbots (mainly Snap MyAI which is embedded within Snapchat), but Character.ai takes this to a whole new dimension as people are creating chatbots based on real people such as Jimmy Saville, Molly Russell (who sadly took her own life) and

Brianna Ghey (who was murdered) to name a few. It is already known that some children and young people are becoming obsessed with chatbots, such as giving them names and referring to them as real people. The concerns around this is growing weekly which emphasises the fact that when we are talking to children and young people we need to be aware of these emerging areas so that we can adequately engage with them.



Old Stoics Remembered

To tie in with the 'For Your Tomorrow' memorial installation of the 1,475 soldiers killed in the D-Day landings on 6 June 1944, displayed in the Grecian Valley by the National Trust, we created a display in the School Library remembering the Old Stoics who lost their lives in active service in WWII.

Nearly 2,000 Old Stoics served in the Armed Forces during the war, with 242 honoured with decorations, including two Victoria Crosses. Tragically, 270 Old Stoics, approximately one in seven, lost their lives in active service.

Reflecting on the end of the war, the then-Headmaster JF Roxburgh expressed a profound pride in their sacrifice, stating - "In considering these figures, it is impossible not to feel pride in the distinguished service which men from this School have rendered in war." Given that Stowe School had opened only in 1923, its loss rate was among the highest of any public school in England, a fact that deeply affected Roxburgh, who knew each boy by name. The toll of these losses was said to have broken him.

Using the Stowe Remembrance book, we displayed individual cards in memory of each of the 270 Old Stoics who gave their lives. These individuals are honoured each year by the entire School community on Remembrance Sunday, a tradition that ensures their service and sacrifice are never forgotten.

We hope that those who visited found a moment of reflection as they viewed the display.

Winter Cleaning

As part of our annual conservation clean, we started with the Marble Hall, which was restored 20 years ago, and most recently had a deep clean about 10 years ago. Our annual work involves the cleaning of the plaster military trophies (the reliefs under the ledge) with a conservation vacuum cleaner from a scaffolding tower, the tops of the lanterns, and the tops of the statues.

From the ground, the statues and torchieres were brushed with a hogshair brush, delicately sweeping the accumulated dust into the conservation vacuum cleaner, and the walls were spot-cleaned for marks. Surprisingly, the dust accumulation wasn't as bad as we thought it might be, but it still took us a day and a half to complete. On the first day, while the Prep School Art Festival pupils were waiting for their first session with the Art Department, we showed them different artefacts involved with restoring and cleaning The State Rooms. We talked to them about the link between science and art that could lead to a career in art and architecture conservation.

During the Winter months, we will conservation clean The Music Room and The Blue Room, with the help of our willing volunteers.


